
## Sports Premium Funding Action Plan 2017 / 18



The Government has again committed to renewing its package of funding for physical education (PE) and school sport. Through this 'Sport Premium' the Government is continuing to provide additional funding to support the delivery of PE and sport in primary schools.

This funding will be ring fenced, and will be allocated directly to primary schools across England, providing them with a dedicated resource to buy in invaluable expertise and support. Funding will be allocated through a lump sum for each school and a per-pupil top-up mechanism. The formula will reference the number of primary-aged pupils (i.e. children between the ages of 5 and 11).

£16,000 plus a premium of £10 per pupil in Years 1-6. This gives our school £17,810 for the academic year 2017/18

## Below is a statement of what we intend spending our funding on for the academic year 2017 / 18 $\,$

Action	Cost	Impact
Payment to Roseland Sports Partnership	£3,600	Support from a cluster employed sports specialist with running sporting fixtures festivals and competitions including, but not limited to, badminton, hockey, netball, football and tennis. Providing opportunities for CPD for staff including motor co-ordination training. <b>Planned impact:</b> Increased opportunities for children to take part in level 2 inter-school and competitive fixture, festivals and competitions. Staff training provided when possible to develop skills and confidence within school. <b>Impact review:</b> Over the course of the academic year 17/18 Probus school fielded 15 separate level 2 competitions though the year. Children from Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 with additional physical and learning needs competed in level 2 competition e.g. Boccia.
Membership to Mid- Cornwall Sports Partnership	£900	<ul> <li>Participation in tier 2 and 3 competitions.</li> <li>Staff CPD including, but not limited to, swimming, sports first aid and hockey.</li> <li>Planned impact: Access to specific sport CPD e.g. Kwik cricket, mini tennis, swimming etc. to raise confidence in PE teaching.</li> <li>Specific children will take part in tier 2 and 3 school games events on our route to the 'school games'.</li> <li>Impact review:</li> <li>The school has benefitted from a reduced rate for training courses and developed more links with different sports personalities e.g. a local Key Stage 2 Pupils have participated in a number of Tier 2 and Tier 3 competitions as part of our journey to the school games.</li> <li>We have continued our attendance at Tier 2 Key Stage 1 events to provide a wider range of sporting competitions for younger pupils.</li> <li>Pupils in Key Stage 2 benefitted from in school coaching from professional cricket coaches. We will not continue this affiliation next year as Aspire will supplement training. We will however purchase entry into the Mid Cornwall X-country.</li> </ul>
Facilitation of children with additional needs learning to swim	£400	Employment and training of staff to facilitate swimming for pupils with physical disabilities. <b>Planned impact:</b> Pupils with additional learning and physical disabilities will be able to attend swimming sessions and gain an awareness of water safety, increase muscle tone and control. <b>Impact review:</b> Pupils with additional motor co-ordination needs benefited from specialist swim teaching, this included activities designed to develop muscle tone and improve muscle elasticity.
Key stage 1 Participation in tier 2 competitions	£100	Including transport costs to facilitate a range of groups from Key Stage 1 to access a variety of tier 2 competitions including competition such as mini tennis, cross country, sports hall athletics etc. Providing opportunities for children with additional needs opportunities to shine. Impact review: Pupils from Key Stage 1 attended 4 separate level 2 competitions giving them the opportunity to develop their understanding of wider competition.

Key stage 2 Participation in tier 2 and 3	£150	<ul> <li>Including transport costs to facilitate a range of ability and groups from Key Stage 2 to access a variety of tier 2 and 3 competitions including cross country, tag rugby, netball, dodgeball etc.</li> <li>Providing opportunities for children with additional needs opportunities to shine.</li> <li>Impact review:</li> <li>Children from Key Stage 2 have been able to attend competitions free of charge. Notable performances in cricket saw our girls invited to county qualifiers, individuals from the boys teams have been invited to receive coaching from a local cricket club. Pupils from Upper Key Stage 2 have taken part in a local triathlon and have tied in with local surf lifesaving clubs (Hayle SLSC).</li> <li>Key Stage 2 pupils attended over a dozen different competitions. A number of pupils have been made aware of and now attend local sports clubs (including St. Austell, Truro and Penryn rugby clubs; both boys and girls, The Heron tennis club, Probus football club, Truro Hockey club, Percuil sailing and Ladock cricket club).</li> <li>As a school we attended 3 'non competitive' sporting events aimed at increasing confidence in PE for less confident participants and / or those with additional needs</li> </ul>
Year 6 open water activities	£750	Part funding of Year 6 class attending water safety and a variety of water based sports including kayaking and windsurfing <b>Planned impact</b> : Children will experience a range of new sports not normally offered whilst developing their understanding open water safety, which is critical in a coastal county. Impact review: Pupils in year 6 attended an RNLI run 'hit the surf' day. This included learning to surf and also basic 'sea safety' and beach side lifesaving skills.
Year 5 open water activities	£750	Part funding of Year 5 class attending water safety and a variety of water based sports including learning basic wind powered sailing skills. <b>Planned impact:</b> Children will experience a f new sport not normally offered whilst developing their understanding open water safety, which is critical in a coastal county. Children will have the opportunity to further link in with the local sailing club for a potential of further coaching / awards. <u>Impact review:</u> At the start of the Autumn term all pupils attended 3 sessions of sailing. This was run at Percuil in association with the sailing club, pupils developed increased water confidence and awareness of open water safety. Several pupils went on to attend additional weekend sailing sessions.
Provision of afterschool sporting clubs	£2,672	Provision of after school clubs led by trained school staff including football, tag rugby, hockey, and KS1 multisport. Impact review: As evidenced in our school games gold award and silver YST mark, pupils at Probus experience a wide range of sporting clubs. We actively highlight the less active 15% of our school population to attend at least 1 term of after school club.
Staff training	£200	Including upskilling staff in teaching of REAL PE and attending MAT PE development opportunities e.g. sport specific refereeing. Impact review: In addition to whole school staff training, a member of staff completed her level 1 FA coaching qualification. She uses this qualification to coach and run a girls football team as part of an afterschool club. These pupils link in with successful local clubs (such as St. Agnes AFC) that provide coaching for both girls and ladies teams. Several of the girls who attended the afterschool football now play for local clubs.
Employment of a sports specialist TA.	£6044	To provide motor co-ordination intervention across the school. (Small group intervention focusing on Agility, Balance and Co-ordination). Pupils identified in liaison with class teachers To work alongside class teachers (on a rotational basis) to provide advice and guidance to further raise the quality of PE taught across the school. By working alongside the sports specialist class teachers will develop their understanding of fundamental PE skills, differentiation within PE and their confidence at adapting, innovating and providing a broad PE curriculum. Impact review:

		All teachers received training from the PE lead and the sports specialist via staff meeting. All teachers have worked alongside the sports specialist to increase confidence and ability to adapt and differentiate a broad and balanced PE curriculum. Groups of children receive both fine and gross motor skill intervention leading to an increased enjoyment and ability in PE as well across the curriculum. Pupils are more confident in 'risk taking' within lessons as a result of being successful when striving for their 'personal best' in PE.
Employment of a TA to facilitate fine and gross motor skills in EYFS and KS1.	£1500	2 afternoons a week of a TA to run intervention programmes such as 'Just write'. Assessment shows pupils are not entering Reception class with appropriate muscle tone and strength to be able to form a pincer grip with control. <b>Planned impact:</b> Pupils will leave Reception class being able to form a pincer grip with control and be 'ready to write'. Pupils in Key Stage 1 who are unable to write with control will have developed better fine and gross motor skills to develop their ability to write.
Year 6 activities day	£750	Part funding of Year 6 class attending an adventure activities day to experience different sports including climbing, abseiling, archery etc. <b>Planned impact:</b> Pupils from year 6 will experience a range of sports not offered in school to broaden their horizons and experiences of sports available in the county. <u>Impact review:</u> Pupils in Year 6 elected to attend a day trampolining. They were given the choice of several different activities including: tramploining, canoeing & climbing). There gymnastics clubs in Cornwall but limited availability for 'try before you pay' coached sessions. This gave the children the opportunity to experience it without cost being a barrier.
